



Introduction

ho decides what are the best teen reads? In this case the best teen reads are those books published within the recent (3-4 years) publishing seasons that have received star reviews from the professional review source or have been tapped as an award-winning book in the year of its publication. For the most part the books listed in the following pages are those that were published for and marketed to young adults. Major exceptions include those books that are identified as adult books which teens will read and enjoy (ALEX award) and picture books which focus on either content that speaks to older readers or which serve as mentor texts for writing or the understanding of literary concepts.

Those considering purchasing and recommending books in the following years will want to note the source of recommendations. Each entry has a code indicating at least one of the awards or recognitions given that book. However, rather than an extensive search to find each and every award to mention the decision was made to concentrate on including references to book trailers and author webpages that would provide information and resources that might be used directly with students. In Chapter 1 – Best Teen Reads, we have identified over 500 titles that we feel are among the best teen reads offered in recent years.

Among the lists/awards included are:

We began to attempt to list all the credible award sources, best lists etc. but decided that to do so would be rather superfluous. If we were to list all the relevant awards/lists for many of the books the "awards" would have seriously limited the number of actual books we could list. For example: for a book such as G. Many others have similar lists – suffice it to say the amount of space such listings would have consumed would have been daunting. We decided a better use of our space would be to indicate one or two awards, and then to provide an indication of the availability of an easily accessible online movie book trailer, interview, or book review. We also used space to list the availability of an author's website or blog. So each annotation does include such notations if such resources are available. There are some omissions however. For example, if there were several book trailers or other resources for one title we only listed the one we felt was most useable in the classroom. If there was only one available and in our evaluation the trailer/review was not well enough produced to warrant recommending, we did not list the resource. So the omission of a listing on the McElmeel101 YouTube Channel might indicate the non-existence of such a resource, or might indicate that any that was available did not meet our standard for inclusion. The WWW is very fluid, however, and it is very conceivable that some appropriate trailers will be produced and uploaded after the publication of this book. So if you are seeking a resource for a particular title – initiate a search on the WWW and see what is there. Our listings should be very time saving for most titles but not all inclusive.

Websites are also indicated when available. We list websites that seem to be under the control of the author (and only official author websites – not publisher sites or fan sites.) Most author websites will link to that author's blog if one is available. In a few cases we have linked information directly to blogs – if there did not seem to be a conventional author website, and if the blog had stand alone pages providing access to information about books, biography, and so forth. We followed every link and in some cases choose to omit a site that might now be active. For example: Lauren Myracle, the acclaimed author of Chime has a domain registered and at one time had a website mounted at www.laurenmyracle.com/. The domain is still there and the website page is still active but an announcement on the page tells visitors that Myracle has put the "website 'on hold' for a few months." Thus, we did not list the website as being an available resource. Sometime after this book is published those months might pass and the site become a valuable resource once again. Readers of this book should understand that the Internet is a fluid and ever evolving resource. What is there today may not be there tomorrow. And sometimes a resource is put up and then is not regularly updated. Authors who have published several books since the last one listed as "coming soon" on a website simply indicates that the site is not as updated as one might wish.

Judging a Book by Its Trailer

Within the annotations in Chapter 1, we have been able to include references to over 400 websites and more than 350 book trailers, video reviews, and video author interviews. While websites, reviews, and author interviews are more easily judged for their singular merit, there is a concern that the quality and presentation in a book trailer may unintentionally reflect negatively on a specific book and in fact, turn readers away, rather

than toward a book. And in fact, in our review of book trailers we found some very poorly executed trailers that added little to encourage readers to pick up the book and some were actually a put off. Some trailers are more advertisements while others are actually more of a short film based on the book. Others are actually THE book, especially in the picture book format. One quote from the marketing director at Allen & Unwin, Karen Williams, included at the end of Kent's article says: "Anyone can make a book trailer but the art is making one that is actually going to help sell it, rather than not." That is what we found while searching for viable book trailers to "sell" the selections listed in our Best Teen Reads list. Some of the trailers would not ever contribute to a sell, in our opinion. Others were great, and many were okay – the trailer provided information, but were rather neutral in terms of inspiration for reading.

More Lists

In addition to the main list in this book, we have included a list of graphic novels and verse novels. Many of those are integrated into the main list with annotations. The specialized lists are a bibliographic listing. For longer annotations of any of those titles please refer to the main list. Not all will be included in the general list in chapter one. Nor will all of the non-fiction titles in that list be included in the chapter one lists. However, those titles in the specific lists do provide an indication of titles that are recommended as the best of the best, but not necessarily award-winning. Each has garnered positive reviews by conventional review sources or have been recommended by librarians working with young adult readers.

Overall the lists in this book are intended as starter lists to put readers in a good place to explore great books. While these lists are quite extensive they are not intended to be exclusive – there are many good books, many great books and many readers who wish to make their own connections. Each reader brings her/his own experience and background to text and illustrations presented in a book. Joining with the author/illustrator, a reader creates her or his own unique reading experience. Each experience must be rated by the reader and each reader's rating will be her/his own. The books listed in this book are merely those books that got top rating from the readers editing this book. Each reader should feel encouraged to build his/her own top-rated list.

Laura Halse Anderson's first books were picture books (including a favorite, *Turkey* Pox [1996]). By 1999, she had moved to young adult fiction and her first highly acclaimed young adult novel was published. Speak won numerous awards, was a finalist for the National Book Award, and was on the New York Times best seller list. In 2004, a film based on the book was released. The book focuses on a thirteen-yearold girl and her inability to speak after she was raped. A historical fiction book, Fever 1793 (Simon & Schuster, 2002) followed Speak, and then Catalyst (Penguin/Viking, 2002) – a tale of Kate Malone which takes place in the same community as *Speak*. Other young adult novels include: *Prom* (2005), *Twisted* (Penguin/Viking, 2007), Wintergirls (2009). Her books do not avoid edgy topics. Her writing has dealt with rape, self-assessment, depression, youthful offenders, and eating disorders. Her historical fiction titles include Fever, 1793, and a series, "Seeds of America" (sometimes referred to as "Chains" series: Chains [2008], Forge [2010], and Ashes [forthcoming]). Chains take place during the American Revolutionary period and focuses on Ruth and Isabel, African American teens who struggle for their freedom. Forge, a sequel to Chains, continues the struggle for freedom during the American Revolution but shifts focus from Isabel to a young man she helped free from Curzon as the story of a runaway slave is told. Ashes was orginally scheduled for release in 2013, but due to some illness the book will be delayed. Read more about the author and her books at www.madwomanintheforest.com.

Collaborative reading suggestions:

Fever, 1793: Introduce the topic of Anderson's Fever, 1793 with a nonfiction book (10 short chapters – 10 pages each) by Jim Murphy, An American Plague: The True and Terrifying Story of the Yellow Fever Epidemic of 1793. Murphy's book examines the events and the causes, and explores how the Yellow Fever helped to change the legal and government policies. The disease affected Dolley Madison (and Presidents Jefferson and Madison), and the Louisiana Purchase in a manner that few have thought about without reading this book. The book contains many pictures and replications of newspaper clippings.

Chains: Pair Anderson's Chains with Sharon Draper's Copper Sun. Sharon Draper tells the story of Amari – and enslaved teen from Ghana. Draper spent ten years researching the facts behind the institution of slavery. Amari was captured in Ghana, brought to America (among horrible conditions) and then given by her buyer to his sixteen-year-old son, Clay, as a birthday present. First she was on a slave ship, then South Carolina, and finally Fort Mose. This is often the 19th century (often during the Victorian era in England) but include major elements of science fantasy or science fiction. Although books that would fit into the Steam punk category were written earlier, the term itself was not coined until 1987.

Yellow Star by Jennifer Roy

Jennifer Roy authored a very important title based on her aunt's life story—a story that we must continue to know so that history never repeats itself. Jennifer Roy's father survived the Holocaust but when he died his story was lost with his death. After his death, his sister, Roy's aunt began to talk about the war years — the time she spent in the ghetto in Poland during the year when more than 269, 200 Jewish people (from her ghetto) were killed. Roy used recordings of her stories to write *Yellow Star* (Amazon Children's Publishing, 2006). *Yellow Star* is a Holocaust story that takes place in 1939, in Lodz, Poland. When the Germans invaded Poland more than 270,000 Jewish people where forced to settle in the ghetto. At war's end there were only 800 survivors — only twelve were children. 

Graphic Novels

raphic novels have a somewhat fluid definition. Early on graphic novels became a format for fictional narrative told in comic book style. Certainly the format grew out of the popularity of the Japanese born Manga that has been enjoyed for decades. Once the popularity of Manga could no longer be ignored publishers of more traditional books began to adopt the format for the telling of stories they wished to publish. Rather quickly the format proved to be very popular among teen readers and then slowly but steadily the format moved downward in age level. Today the graphic format is used to present all types of writing, including: myths, fictional stories, hero tales, early reading/chapter books, biographies, and other informational titles. Whether or not the book is fictional, informational, biography, or whatever the term of this format is termed "graphic novels."

Is Manga the Same as a Graphic Novel?

The Japanese cite the picture scrolls of the twelfth and thirteenth century as the beginning of the manga art form. Manga is considered an important element of Japanese culture. Japan's ancient capital of Kyoto is considered a manga center and the home of many manga and anime artists. In 2007 Japan's first museum dedicated to the manga culture opened in Kyoto. In the first two weeks the museum had 10,000 visitors. The number of visitors in such a short time is a small indication of the immense popularity of manga in Japan.

Whether or not manga is included in the "graphic novel" designation is not an issue that all agree on. There are certain characteristics unique to the Manga form. Those characteristics are not necessarily present in other graphic novels. Manga is closely related to the Japanese film medium, anime, and remains very popular as a companion format to that medium.

Techniques typically used in the manga art form include: screen tone, expressive dialogue bubbles, speed lines, mini-flashbacks, and abstract background effects. More apparent to the reader who is not familiar with the art techniques per se is the artists' use of a unique style of showing characters. Characters in manga stories are most often shown with large eyes, small noses, tiny mouths, and flat faces. The eyes of the female characters are often larger than those of the male characters. This style of presenting characters in manga and anime originated in the 1960s, and interestingly, although manga and anime originated in Japan, the depiction of the eyes, as large, were inspired by Disney cartoons. American soldiers noticed the typical manga images, after World War II. It was American soldiers who returned to the United States with manga.

There is such popularity that even manga has sub-formats. *Primarily women artists draw Shōjo manga*. *Shōjo* manga is created for an audience of girls and young women. *Shōnen, seinen,* and *seijin* manga is intended for the male audience – focusing on action-

adventure, and male heroes. The various manga distinctions for male manga are based on age appropriateness with the seijin clearly being "adult" manga. Many *shōnen* manga have science fiction and technology themes.

Japanese manga is often series driven. Panels and pages are typically read from right to left. Examples of popular manga series include: *Akira*, *Sailor Moon*, *Dragon Ball*, and *Ranma 1/2*

One of the overriding factors that moved the mainstream publishers in the United States to enter into the graphic novel area was the immense popularity of manga. Because of the many cultural mores of the Japanese, educators were heavily critical of the sexual overtones of many of the manga titles, the objectification of the female figure, and in general the mature nature of some of the titles. The Japanese manga titles are, much as movies in the United States, rated for maturity and the spines of the books indicate that level. Despite the objections of educators (and parents) readers clearly were enamored with the form.

Graphic Novels Go Mainstream

Once all novels in a graphic form came from Japan or at least the Asian countries as manga had moved across Asia and across the ocean to the United States. But once the popularity became apparent and that the popularity was going to remain despite the objections to the form based on cultural mores, mainstream publishers began to look at the form to structure their own publishing offerings. At first the publications were sparse — but the popularity and acceptance came quickly as educators began to give quasi-approval of the American offerings. Publishers such as Scholastic, Abrams, Lerner, Farrar Strauss and Giroux, Candlewick and many others joined DC Comics, Marvel Comics, and Kodansha Comics USA among others.

Popularity of the format began to come to the awareness of the general public when Art Spiegelman, an American cartoonist, interviewed his father about his life as a Polish Jew and Holocaust survivor. He used those experiences to help him write a serialized magazine article for *Raw* – a magazine he and his wife published. Eventually the writings were collected into *Maus I* and *Maus II* and earned Spiegelman a Pulitzer Award. The publisher, Pantheon, is credited with coining the phrase "graphic novel" although Spiegelman did not consider his work strictly a "novel" as it was more biographical than fiction. Critics debated just what the writing was. But whatever the classification the term "graphic novel" became the term attributed to book length novels/biographies written in comic book style.

Another corner stone was turned when First Second Books published Gene Luen Yang's young adult graphic novel, *American Born Chinese*, in 2006. The book was a finalist for the 2006 National Book Awards in the Young People's literature category. It won the 2007 Michael L. Printz Award— the first major literature award won by a graphic novel for young readers. Full acceptance of the format came quickly and now encompasses all

genres of literature including non-fiction. The term "graphic novels" is a generic term used to refer to both fiction and non-fiction. And to clarify "graphic novel" is a format, not a genre. Graphic novels encompass all genres.

Who Reads Graphic Novels?

It would seem flip to answer, "Everyone." However, that seems to be the case if young adult readers are given the opportunity to choose their reading material. Often when educators talk about graphic novels there seems to be a phrase heard over and over graphic novels are great for struggling (or less able or reluctant readers. It is true that many reluctant or less-able readers are drawn to reading through the graphic format. There are many essential skills that are required for a young reader to read a graphic novel. Skills include the ability to understand sequence of events, to understand a character's nonverbal gestures, determine the story's plot, and make inferences. Knowledge of literary devices enhances the reading experiences—literary devices including the various narrative structures, the use of metaphors and symbolism, use of puns, alliteration, and different points of view. Comprehension of all reading material, conventional text, and graphic novels, demand similar skills. There are some challenges specific and unique to graphic novels that a reader must be willing to deal with and master. Graphic novels present the material in both text and pictures but in a graphic novel this presentation utilizes a series of panels, word balloons, and captions and sometimes being able to read right to left. Art does help connect the textual content which is one of the reasons some learners find this reading format more enjoyable as compared to the conventional text focused presentation and the text and art connection enhances content. Graphic novels also seem to improve reading development and comprehension for students with language acquisition problems as well as Englishlanguage learners.

The critical question then is, do graphic novels appeal to the struggling, reluctant reader? The answer is "Yes," but they also appeal to students of all types of abilities. Graphic novels provide opportunities to think critically with the potential of becoming lifelong readers.

For those who feel that graphic novels are somehow easier than books presented in a conventional text format will want to consider the research:

In the early 1980s, Larry D. Dorrell and Edward Carroll writing in *School Library Journal* (1981, vol. 27; no. 10, pp. 17-19) "Spider-Man at the Library" provides research indicating that the presence of comic books in a library collection increased library use 82%, and increased the circulation of non-graphic book material by 30%.

In the late 1990s Donald P. Hayes and Margaret G Ahrens wrote an article "Vocabulary Simplification for Children: A special case of 'motherese," for the *Journal of Child Language* (1998, 15, pp. 395-410). In that article they discuss the simplification of language when we talk to age-dependent groups. They share a study of "rare words per 1000," showed that comic books introduced more new words than did adult books. The ratio was 53.5 words/1000 to 52.7 words/1000.

Other studies cite the positive correlation between the literacy rate in Finland (99%) and library usage, in proportion to comic book reading. Several studies conclude that the average comic book introduced young readers to twice as many words as the average children's book and even more in relation to the average child-adult conversation. Verse Novels & Poetry

erse novels and poetry are fast becoming the genre of note. Attracting reluctant readers, providing an interesting forum for able readers, and providing a unique and varying selection for readers of all ages. Verse novels utilize a broad range of poetic blank verse to tell a story — a story that, just like other forms, resonant with readers either as a mirror to their own lives or a window to look outside of their singular environment.

Poetry is a form of literature that brings forth a wide variety of experiences and showcases unique views of the words used. Each poet can bring a unique image to readers and listeners and can provide new insights into otherwise familiar topics. Poetry is not something that you find: poetry finds you, and you must go where poems can be found. We must surround young readers with poetry. Poetry is for all places. Lee Bennett Hopkins www.leebennetthopkins.com is often referred to as the Pied Piper of Poetry. He and many other poets implore educators not to reduce poetry to an assignment, not to reduce the poetry unit to an introduction of the structure or form and then ask the young people you work with to "write a haiku" or whatever form is being studied. The substance of good poetry is not its form but rather what is said (and not said). Surround young readers and listeners with all forms of poetry giving them the rhythm and language of the form while allowing their own writing to take whatever form is most appropriate.

In April of each year the Academy of American Poets sponsors National Poetry Month and in concert with the academy the Center for the Book in the Library of Congress designates the third week of April as Young People's Poetry week. Check for activities at www.poets.org and the Children's Book Council www.cbcbooks.org.

In the past decades a number of novels written in blank verse have made inroads in attracting readers. A hug number these books address contemporary social issues. I am somewhat hesitant to recommend or list this otherwise awesome blogger's site as during the several times the site was visited there was no where on the site any information regarding who is responsible for the content on the site. Sometimes the site content links to outside interviews, book reviews etc. but the original content is not attributed in any way to the author. Leaves one wondering if the site is actually a credible site or someone's idea of a great self-marketing tool. Serious researchers will not want to rely on the site's content until the original source (with attribution) can be located and become the source of any scholarly citation.

Poetry

Poetry ... is the opening and closing of a door, leaving those who look through to guess what was seen during a moment.

There are many classic poets that you are surely familiar with: Carl Sandburg, Edgar Allan Poe, Maya Angelou, Robert Frost, William Blake, Alfred Noyes, Langston Hughes, Edna St. Vincent Millay, Emily Dickinson, Hilaire Belloc, John Keats, Khalil Gibran, Ogden Nash, Paul Laurence Dunbar, Robert Browning, Walt Whitman, William Wordsworth, Aileen Fisher, William Carlos William, and many more. Rather than listing titles of contemporary poetry books, I'd like to introduce you to some very awesome contemporary poets and anthologists that deserve a good look. For each of the following poets investigate the poet's website and check out their current poetry titles, including their backlists. Here are some favorites poets.

Read the poetry of these poets and help young readers discover connections. Surround young learners with poetry. For example: Marilyn Nelson's sonnet, *A Wreath for Emmett Till* (Houghton Mifflin Books for Children, 2005), is a heroic crown of sonnets. This collection of poems combines to present a historically accurate story of the young boy murdered in the 1950s for flirting with a white store clerk. The last line of one poem becomes the first line of the next. A heroic crown sonnet must conform to the iambic pentameter of an individual sonnet. Then the poet must take the last line of each of the fourteen sonnets and use that last line as the first line for the next. Finally the fifteenth sonnet is composed of the first line of each of the preceding fourteen sonnets.

Nelson added something more to her heroic sonnet however, she created the sonnet in such a way that the first letter of each of the last sonnet of fourteen lines form an acrostic with spells out: *RIP EMMETT L TILL*.

Poetry is always best read aloud and Marilyn Nelson does this on a recording made at the Wisconsin Book Festival – she is recorded reading aloud the final 29 lines of her *A Wreath for Emmett Till*. This would be a powerful introduction to the sonnets of Shakespeare – he used the form often in his writing. Check ro Nelson's reading on the YouTube Channel McElmeel101 – Best Teen Reads – Part II.

A basic definition of iambic pentameter can be found on a site devoted to the pattern of syllables referred to as iambic pentameter. Check the Iambic Pentameter home page at: www.iambicpentameter.net/. This is another one of those websites that contain no attribution regarding who owns the site and who is responsible for the content. The site is very informative and will also have links to poems from Shakespeare's sonnets as well as other examples. If students use information from this site I would recommend locating the original site/source and harvesting appropriate information from that site/source. For more connections to literacy and Shakespeare see the Words-of-Fun section in this book.

Illustrated Short Stories

(A Picture Book by Any Other Name)

elling stories with pictures dates back as early as the cave days when cavemen told their stories with wall paintings. But the modern day illustrated short story (picture books) emerged with Randolph Caldecott (1846-1886). He is credited as being the first to use images not merely as a decorative element but as a storytelling element. Maurice Sendak (1928-2012) describes Caldecott's work and the invention of the picture book by saying: "Caldecott's work heralds the beginning of the modern picture book. He devised an ingenious juxtaposition of picture and word, a counter point that never happened before. Words are left out — but the picture says it. Pictures are left out—but the words say it." ("A Brief History of Children's Picture Books and the Art of Visual Storytelling," by Maria Popova. 24 Feb. 2012 [Online] www.brainpickings.org/index.php/2012/02/24/childrens-picturebooks/

Picture books began to enjoy more popularity in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. Better printing methods and changing attitudes toward childhood spun picture books into its golden era. Timeless classics came into being, the books of *Curious George* (H.A. Rey and Margret Rey, Houghton Publishers), the Babar Series (Jean De Brunhoff, Random House Publishers), and the classic Millions of Cats by Wanda Gág (Coward-McCann, 1928). The early picture books from Caldecott's time include titles as: The House That Jack Built (1878), Hey Diddle Diddle and Baby Bunting (1882), The Frog He Would A-Wooing Go (1883). They were less instructive than early books for children and definitely more entertaining.

Illustrated Short Stories in the Secondary Classroom

Picture books are often relegated simply to the children's department but there are many picture books that speak more eloquently to older readers and many more that appeal to several generational tiers.

In 2008, the Korean CJ Corporation launched the CJ Picture Book Festival. The festival takes place in South Korea and recognizes the importance of picture books by stating, "Picture books, in the present era, enjoy a status as a culture form to be enjoyed by people of all ages. It is a precious and versatile art that has already left the confines of paper

behind, shattering the boundaries of its own genre and fusing with various other forms of art and imagery."

Innovative teachers of secondary students utilize picture books to spur interest in a topic or to provide additional information about a topic. Picture books can be paired with a longer book text to provide a comparison title or set the stage for more research and reading. Many picture books, especially those with a historical focus, are appropriate for (and in many cases are actually targeted to) older readers. Younger readers are not yet ready to comprehend historical events that have taken place years ago. In fact, according to Jean Piaget who became a major figure in 20th-century developmental psychology, it is not until the third, or concrete operational stage (generally from age 7 to age 11 or 12) that young people begin to grasp concepts of time and number. Before this age, all events are in the here and now. This is one reason, for example, that the teaching of the "First Thanksgiving" is not recommended for Pre-School, kindergarten and first grade students. Depictions of events that occurred long ago do not resonant with young learners who are in the second, or preoperational stage (those children from age two to approximately six or seven). Past events are viewed as if the event occurred at the most, yesterday. The concept of hundreds of years ago has little or no meaning.

Picture books that bring a sense of a historical time period will have much more meaning for the older (twelve-years-old and up) reader, as will the historical event that is involved. Other titles deal with topics that are of more interest to the older reader. For example, *Gregor Mendel: The Friar Who Grew Peas* by Cheryl Bardoe, illustrated by Jos. A. Smith (Harry N. Abrams, 2006) speaks of genetics and the beginning of Mendel's experiments that established the scientific endeavors the "universal law that would apply to all living things." Detailed illustrations in Bardoe's book introduce and expand the reader's understanding of traits, heredity patterns, and crossbreeding — all topics of interest to older students interested in biology.

Using Picture Books with Older Readers

- **Read Aloud:** Use the book as a read aloud to motivate a larger group to be interested in a specific topic/event.
- Collaborative Read: Use the book as one of several titles that the readers would read independently or as a small group and then collaborate on the information gleaned about a specific era/topic. After a list of "facts" is generated, readers could verify the "facts" in creditable websites or reference books (Motivation for further reading/research).
- **Mentor Text**: A mentor text is a published piece of writing a teacher uses during a writing lesson to teach a writing skill or to motivate the students to write something creatively similar.
- **Develop Higher Order Thinking Skills (HOTS)**: Stream of consciousness, inter-textually, and symbolism can be taught to students through post-modern picture books.

There are many resources that can provide a list of earlier/classic titles that are superb picture books for use with middle school/high school readers.

Selected List: Recent Picture Books and Ideas

This list is not intended as a definitive list of all picture books to be used in a secondary classroom. The list is intended to provide a look at some exceptional titles that are representative of some of the uses of picture book titles in the secondary classroom/library to stimulate further inquiry and increase thinking about specific topics.

Burleigh, Robert. Look Up! Henrietta Leavitt, Pioneering Woman Astronomer. Illustrated by Raúl Colón. Paula Wiseman Book/Simon & Schuster, 2013. Henrietta Leavitt (b. 1868) attended Oberlin (now Radcliffe) and was one of the few women to study astronomy. Her work at the Harvard College Observatory had her spending her time confined to measuring and recording distances between starts (considered as both menial labor and suitable for women). In the process of her measuring she noted patterns of star brightness and used that knowledge to perfect the measurements between celestial objects. Her work was published and gained her much respect in the field of astronomy.

Curriculum Idea: Introduce a unit in astronomy. Further research into the life of Henrietta Swan Leavitt

Book Connection: *Miss Leavitt's Stars: The Untold Story of the Woman Who Discovered How to Measure the Universe* by George Johnson. W.W. Norton & Company, 2006 (pb).

Golio, Gary. *Jimi Sounds Like a Rainbow: A Story of the Young Jimi Hendrix*. Illustrated by Javaka Steptoe. Clarion, 2011. (CSK Illustrator Award 2011). Shares the childhood of the superstar, rebel, hero, and innovator that became a driving force in the world of rock and roll. Jimmy Hendrix emerged into the world as Jimi Hendrix.

Curriculum Idea: Jimi Hendrix had a passion. Ask readers to brainstorm things they

are passionate about and then devise a plan to act on that passion. What type of career might the passion lead to? What are the possibilities for using the passion to further involve that passion into his/her life?

Jenkins, Steve, and Robin Page. How to Clean a Hippopotamus: A Look at Unusual Animal Partnerships. Illustrated by Steve Jenkins. Houghton Mifflin Books for Children/Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2010.

Animal partnerships often defy explanation —a water buffalo and an egret; badger and a coyote; horse mackerel and a Portuguese man-of-war. A fascinating picture book featuring symbiotic relationships in the animal kingdom. Illustrated with glorious torn-paper collage. ALA NOTABLE 2011

Curriculum Idea: Vocabulary-"symbiotic," Research additional symbiotic relationships and write a journal/newspaper style article about the relationship.

Jenkins, Steve. *Bones: Skeletons and How They Work.* Illustrated by Steve Jenkins. Scholastic Reference, 2010.

Collage illustrations support exploration and comparison of various human and animal skeletons, from fingers to skulls. Hands, feet, femurs, ribs, spine, and skull are shown and compared to other species. A visual springboard to more information. ALA NOTABLE 2011

Curriculum Idea: Research the bones of another animal and compare those animal bones to the human skeleton or another animal skeleton or choose one body part such as a leg and research several animals and the bones of their leg. Illustrate the comparisons.

Johnson, Jen Cullerton. Seeds of Change: Wangari's Gift to the World. Illustrated by Sonia Lynn Sadler. Lee & Low Books, 2010. CSK Illustrator Award 2011. Wangari Maathai won the Nobel Peace Prize for her environmental work in Kenya. Her efforts have been lauded as bringing nature and economic growth back to Kenya. Curriculum Idea: Read several book about this Nobel Peace Prize winner and books about other similar projects, and devise a plan where one person or one group can make a difference in your own surroundings. Ask this question: What can YOU do to make our community/country a better place? Make sure the answers suggested are actual actions that the person can actually do.

Book Connections: The following list share other picture books that highlight efforts to plant trees, to make a change in third world countries. Compare the work of Dr. Gordon Sato (*The Mangrove Tree: Planting Trees to Feed Families* by Susan L. Roth & Cindy Trumbore. Lee & Low Publishers, 2011) with the work of Wangaari Maathai and her project of planting trees in Kenya. Read Johnson's book along with these three titles:


- a. *Wangari's Trees of Peace: A true story of Africa* by Jeanette Winter. Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2008.
- b. *Planting the trees of Kenya: The story of Wangari Maathai* by Claire A. Nivola. Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2008.
- c. *Mama Miti: Wangari Maathai and the Trees of Kenya* by Donna Jo Napoli, with illustrations by Kadir Nelson. Simon & Schuster, 2010.

Krull, Kathleen. How the Civil War Led to "Little Women." Illustrated by Carlyn Beccia. Walker & Company, 2013.

Krull hones in on Louisa May Alcott's life during the Civil War period and showcases the future author's conviction as an abolitionist and Alcott's volunteer work as a war nurse. As a volunteer in a Civil War hospital her letters from the hospital were published to great acclaim and contributed to her finding her true vocation.

Curriculum Idea: Women's Role during the Civil War (preface explains some of the details of a woman's status during this period).

Book Connection: Use this title to provide background for the reading of the classic title, *Little Women* and other titles by Louisa May Alcott.



Moss, Marissa. *Nurse, Soldier, Spy: The Story of Sarah Edmonds, a Civil War Hero*. Illustrated by John Hendrix. Harry N. Abrams, 2011.

Sarah Edmonds disguised herself as a man and became a soldier and nurse during the Civil War. The book focuses on Edmond (a soldier known as Frank Thompson) but includes a detailed view of military life during the Civil War. There are army camp layouts, and hand drawn typography highlights. Both the text and illustrations include many detailed highlighting Edmonds courage and determination.

Curriculum Idea: Civil War, Women in History Book Connection: Use to introduce longer historical narratives/biographies. See book entry in Chapter 1, for: Moss, Marissa. *A Soldier's Secret*. Harry N. Abrams/Amulet Books, 2012.

Martin, Jacqueline Briggs. The Chiru of High Tibet. Illustrated by Linda Wingerter. Houghton Mifflin Books for Children, 2010. For centuries, dozens of spinning wheels and wooden shuttle looms hummed in the hands of weavers in Jammu and Kashmir (India) as they spun and wove fine, highly sought after, shawls from the "king of wool," Shahtoosh — the wool of the Chiru. The shawls were so fine that a shawl could pass through a woman's wedding ring. Kashmiri legend tells of French emperor, Napoleon, presenting one to Josephine. For centuries the weavers believed that the wool was gathered from bushes where the Chiru, Tibetan antelope, brushed against the bush. The truth is the Chiru live on a plateau where there are no bushes to brush against, and the fine wool is the under wool, which can only be obtained by killing the animals. Three-to-five Chiru must be killed to obtain enough fibers to weave just one Shahtoosh shawl. The wool is harvested in Tibet (China), smuggled across Nepal, and spun and weaved in India. The Chiru is nearing extinction. Curriculum Idea: Research the status of the Chiru (and other endangered animals. Research aids for the Chiru may be found at – McBookwords–*The Chiru of High* Tibet by Jacqueline Briggs Martin (Online) McBookwords bit.ly/chirutibet.

Stone, Tanya Lee. Who Says Women Can't Be Doctors. Illustrated by Marjorie Priceman. Christy Ottaviano/Henry Holt & Company, 2013.

A biography of Elizabeth Blackwell who lived in the 1830s and became America's first female physician. See blog post at: http://bit.ly/Stone-womencan
Curriculum Idea: Team with the picture book biography of Mary Walker (Harness, Cheryl. Mary Walker Wears the Pants: The True Story of the Doctor, Reformer, and Civil War Hero. Illustrated by Carlo Holinari. (Albert Whitman, 2013). Research: Create a timeline showing the lives of Blackwell and Walker. Do they intersect? Were they contemporaries? Did they ever meet? What traits did each of these women share?

Thomson, Ruth Terezin: Voices from the Holocaust. Candlewick, 2011.

Using the voices of those that lived there, Thomson tells the story of the Terezin concentration camp as she grounds her tales in solid research. And presents that research in an accessible magazine-style layout. BCCB

Curriculum Idea: Connect with any title focusing on the Holocaust and World War II. Information about the Japanese Concentration camps in the United States might be integrated with these tales. Connect with more titles listed at: Historical Novels and Picture Books for World War II — Dr. Seuss and More. McElmeel.com (Online) www.mcelmeel.com/curriculum/picturebooks_WWII.html.

Tingle, Tim. Saltypie: A Choctaw Journey from Darkness into Light. Illustrated by Karen Clarkson. Cinco Puntos, 2010. ALA NOTABLE 2011
An autobiographical vignette shows a modern Choctaw family enduring and supporting each other with love, courage, and fortitude in the face of prejudice. The Tingle family used the term "Saltypie" to refer to any adversity that they faced in life. The phrase originated when Tim's father, as a two-year-old mistook the blood running down his mother's face for cherry pie filling. When his small fingers brushed the liquid, he licked his fingers and realized it was not his favorite cherry pie but something unpleasant to his taste. He called it "saltypie" and so saltypie became the phrase used to describe the many adversities the family faced from many sources including the racism the family endured. ALA NOTABLE 2011 Curriculum Idea:

- 1) Discuss adversity and prejudices various ethnic groups face.
- 2) "Saltypie" is an idiom that the family coined. Investigate idioms used in other cultures for "saltypie" situations. Go to: *McBookwords—Saltypie: A Choctaw Journey from Darkness into Light* by Tim Tingle (Online) www.mcbookwords.com/books/saltypie.html for some resources for research.

McKissack, Patricia. *Never Forgotten.* Illustrated by Leo and Diane Dillon. Schwartz & Wade, 2011.

A sequence of narrative free-verse poems -- an eighteenth-century West African blacksmith uses the natural elements to uncover the fate of his son who was captured and sold into slavery. BCCB

Curriculum Idea: Share other narrative poems that share the experience of Africans and African-Americans during the era of slavery. Marilyn Nelson wrote a moving

portrait *Fortune's Bones: The Manumission Requiem.* Front Street, 2004. The poem commemorates the life/skeleton of Fortune – a slave who died in 1798. A doctor rendered the body, reassembled the bones and had the skeleton in his office until he died.

Woodson, Jacqueline. *Each Kindness.* Illustrated E. B. Lewis. Nancy Paulsen Books, 2012

This exquisitely illustrated book will open a tender spot, focus the reader on behavior and its effect on not only the bullied but eventually on the one during the bullying. Maya, the new girl in Chloe's class, wants to be friends but she wears old dresses and eats odd food. No one responds to her overtures of friendship. The other girls dub her "Not New." Then one day her seat in the classroom is empty – it is a book that will haunt readers with its unpredictable ending.

Curriculum Idea: Compare and contrast with the concept of "paying it forward." Discuss what that phrase means and how this book might have encompassed that concept.

Book Connection: Pair with fiction title - *Wonder* by R.J. Palacio (Knopf, 2012 – see entry in Chapter 1. Both will stimulate a wonder-filled discussion focused on human behavior and anti-bullying.

Spotlighted Classic Titles

These are just a few of the many titles that are available. Take a stroll in your local library's picture book section. Browse through several shelves of books. Find the World War II connections in Dr. Seuss's books. Check the brief information at www.mcelmeel.com/curriculum/picturebooks_WWII.html. These few listings that follow, are simply intended to stimulate thinking about picture books and how each might be utilized to promote more thinking, research, and investigation.

Appelt, Kathi. *Miss Lady Bird's Wildflowers: How a First Lady Changed America.* Illustrated by Joy Fisher Hein. HarperCollins, 2005.

Lady Bird Johnson's life as she emerged from a lonely childhood in the Piney Woods of East Texas to become the first lady during President Lyndon B. Johnson's tenure as president. The one constant was her love of nature, especially wildflowers. That love inspired many of her initiatives during her own years in the White House–parks in Washington, D.C., regulation of billboards nationwide, and an emphasis on bringing wildflowers to public places.

Curriculum Idea: Research: State Wildflowers; Access the Wildflower Activity Kit pdf at www.kathiappelt.com/styles/keeper/Wildflowers Activity Kit.pdf -- The activity kit is intended for a younger audience but there is a template for a matching game using wildflowers as a subject. Use the idea to create a matching game for wildflowers in your home state. Some might include those that are in the game in the kit, but others will have to be added.

Book Connection: Choose one of the United States' first ladies (Access list at *First Ladies of the United States* (Online) National First Ladies' Library http://www.firstladies.org/biographies/) and create a picture book. Use *Miss Lady*

Bird's Wildflowers as a mentor text. First Ladies: From Martha Washington to Michelle Obama by Betty Caroli, Oxford University Press, 2010, will be an excellent research source.

Macaulay, David. Black and White. Houghton Mifflin, 1990. Caldecott Award 1991.

A wordless book, each page encompassing four panels. Each of the four panels tell a story, seemingly unrelated to the other panels, throughout the book. However, careful readers will find that there are really five stories in the book as the interconnections build between the four obvious stories readers will realize there is a fifth story that has been created by the four stories. Dan the Robber, a cow story, a boy on a train, and one about the kids and their parents converge at the end to connect the story to the newspaper and people waiting for the train.

Curriculum Idea: Share the story and discuss to develop convergent thinking and higher order thinking skills.

Book Connection: Activating this type of thinking will aid in the reading of books such as Virginian Woolf's *To the Lighthouse* (various editions since 1927) which includes the author's innovative use of nonlinear plot, stream- of-consciousness, and varying narrators, transforms the apparently 'normal' incidents in the life of the Ramsay family into a mythic reflection on time, gender, morality, and death.

Pairing Picture Books with Novels/Information Books

Many picture books are effective introductions to the subject in novels/ information books and will provide some background for topics in the lengthier selections. Finding these connections takes a thorough knowledge of literature—know the novel or information book that you wish to share and then go looking for an "illustrated short story" to introduce that concept, subject, or idea. The following list is far from exhaustive but the examples will provide a start:

Set 1:

Novel/Information Book: *Elijah of Buxton* by Christopher Paul Curtis. Picture books:

Moses by Carole Boston Weatherford, illustrated by Kadir Nelson (Hyperion , 2006) —story of Harriet Tubman.

Henry's Freedom Box: A True Story from the Underground Railroad by Ellen Levine, illustrated by Kadir Nelson (Scholastic, 2007)— story of a slave who mailed himself to freedom.

Freedom River by Doreen Rappaport, illustrated by Bryan Collier (Hyperion, 2000)

Show Way by Jacqueline Woodson, illustrated by Hudson Talbott (Putnam, 2005. Night Running: How James Escapted with the Help of His Faithful Dog by Elisa Carbone, illustrated by E.B. Lewis (Knopf Books for Young Readers, 2008) Only Passing Through by Anne Rockwell, illustrated by R. Gregory Christie (Knopf Books for Young Readers, 2000)

Uses: Establish background for the historical setting, and additional Underground Railroad stories; discuss the art by the illustrators and the artists' use of shape and perspective.

Set 2:

Novel/Information Book: *The Land* by Mildred D. Taylor (Speak, 2003 pb) Picture books:

Let It Shine: Three Favorite Spirituals by Ashley Bryan (Atheneum, 2007) — lyrics of spirituals

Band of Angels by Deborah Hopkinson, illustrated by Raul Colon (Aladdin, 2002 pb)—history of the Fisk Jubilee Singers

Uses: Brings a sense of the history of spirituals, and shares their rhythm and historical impact.

Set 3:

Novel/Information Book: *Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry* by Mildred D. Taylor (Dial, 1977, 2001 reissue)

Picture books:

Ruth and the Green Book by Calvin Alexander Ramsey and Gwen Strauss, illustrated by Floyd Cooper (Carolrhoda, 2010).

Uses:

The green book is a guide for African-Americans as they travel through the segregated South of the 1950s. The book is fiction but the Green Book did play a role in helping African Americans travel through the South, and maneuver the Jim Crow laws. Set 4:

Using Picture Books to Provide Prior Knowledge

Using groups of picture books to introduce middle or high school students to a concept or subject can be very effective. Using groups of books focusing on a topic helps to differentiate the study; or using one title as a read-aloud (use a document camera) accelerates the anticipatory set for study units. Examples of suggested sets of books for building anticipation and stimulating curiosity (BASC) books are provided below.

BASC Books

These books are selected from those that are the best for the topic. Not all are currently in print or available from the publisher, for purchase. Some are only available currently in paperback. Each title, which might not be available for purchase might well be available in your school or local library. Books come and go in the realm of publishing but those books with earlier publishing date are likely only available in one of your nearby libraries. The more recent publishing years would tend to indicate availability for purchase – but that may change on any day. So in a nutshell – use this list as a search list and know that new titles are being published each publishing season and other books, which are currently available, may not be when you use this list – so you may be able to locate additional titles and others may not be available. The list is a starting point.

Researching and Writing – Becoming an Expert (Using picture books and discussion as a model for more research)

Students can develop a passion for a topic and learn as much as they can about that topic. There are numerous publishing opportunities or opportunities for sharing. The following two picture books share information about puffins and lead to more information. Yvonne Spence gives us a great example of drilling down to find information on her HubPages about Puffins. Share these books with older readers and discuss the situation and how the environmental changes change the way the puffins live and interact with their ecosystem.

The Plight of the Puffin

The story of the puffin and the plight facing them is basically a little known story. Each year in April, small coastal islands, Westman Islands, off the coast of Iceland become home to thousands of puffins. These small black and white seabirds come to the islands and spend a summer caring for newly hatched birds. But eventually early in the fall the young birds, pufflings, are sent out to sea. That is the season that Icelandic citizens come out to help. Small pufflings that get confused and end up in village streets instead of the sea are gently rescued and set out to sea. The story of the annual rescue is told in:

Lewins' book provides a great vehicle for reading aloud and sharing questions and discussion activities about a writing trait that can then be applied to longer readings.

Before the Lewins wrote about the Atlantic Puffin (Fratercula arctica) in their book, Bruce McMillan had started his relationship with the Atlantic puffin years earlier. Information about author Bruce McMillan's experience with the Atlantic Puffin is detailed on his Puffin webpage on his site,

Book Awards

(Literary • Choice)

Literary Awards — Single Book

Awards that are given for a single title, based on the book's perceived literary value. A committee commissioned by the sponsoring organization or organizations decides the book's worthiness. Most often the criteria for eligible books set time and place of publication criteria and criteria for the author/illustrator. Examples of this type of award include the John Newbery Award, the Michael L. Printz Award; and the Golden Kite Award.

Literary Awards —Body of Work

Awards that are given for multiple titles created by a single person. Rather than being presented for a single title this type of award takes into consideration the totality of the book creator's works. A committee commissioned by the sponsoring organization or organizations decides the worthiness of a specific author or illustrator's body of work. Most often the criteria for eligible books set time and place of publication criteria and criteria for the author/illustrator. Examples of this type of award include the Margaret Edwards Award and the Hans Christian Anderson Award.

Choice Awards — Single Book

This award is often a combination of choices made by professional educators or authors and readers. This type of award is often sponsored by reading or librarian organizations that has a committee to choose the core list of books to be considered for the award. The appropriate readers who choose and select the award winner read the list. State awards are most often this type of award. The Michael L. Printz Award for Excellence in Young Adult Literature

The Michael L. Printz Award is an award for a book that exemplifies literary excellence in young adult literature. It is named for a Topeka, Kansas school librarian who was a long-time active member of the Young Adult Library Services Association. An award committee, which can also name as many as four honor books, gives the award annually. Fiction, non-fiction, poetry, or an anthology is eligible. Joint authors or editors are eligible as well. The books must be published between January 1 and December 31 of preceding year and be designated by its publisher as being either a young adult book or one published for the age range that YALSA defines as young adult, i.e. ages 12 through 18. Booklist, a publication of ALA, sponsors the award.

Words-of-Fun

Thinking About Vocabulary Things

The Common Core State Standards put an increased emphasis on building a strong vocabulary so that students can read and understand more challenging material. Some of these activities will provide some play with words and vocabulary while incorporating grammar skills, some integration with classics, words in myths, and just play with words. These activities are intended to provide a few ideas for word play, building vocabulary with something other than "define the word," "write it in a sentence," type of activities. Hopefully these suggestions will provide the seeds for additional word play/vocabulary activities.

Heteronyms

We've all heard of synonyms (a word having the same or nearly the same *meaning* as another), antonyms (a word having an opposite *meaning* as another), and homonyms (words that have the same sound and often the same spelling but differ in *meaning*), but how about heteronyms? You've all used them. A heteronym is simply a pair of words (sometimes three) that have three critical elements:

- 1) Spelled the same (homographs)
- 2) Pronounced differently (heterophones), and
- 3) Have a different meaning

Wound: The bandage was wound around the wound.

Produce: The farm was used to produce produce.

Refuse: The dump was so full that it had to refuse more refuse.

Polish: We must polish the Polish furniture.

Lead: He could lead if he would get the lead out.

Desert: The soldier decided to desert his dessert in the desert.

Present: There is no time like the present, to give a present to a friend.

Bass: A bass was painted on the head of the bass drum.

Dove: When shot at, the dove dove into the bushes.

Object: I did not object to the object.

Invalid: The insurance was invalid for the invalid.

Row: There was a row among the oarsmen about how to row.

Close: They were too close to the door to close it.

Does: The buck does funny things when the does are present.

Sewer: A seamstress and a sewer fell down into a sewer line.

Sow: To help with planting, the farmer taught his sow to sow.

Wind: The wind was too strong to wind the sail.

Tear: Upon seeing the tear in the painting I shed a tear.

Subject: I had to subject the subject to a series of tests.

Intimate: How can I intimate this to my most intimate friend?

Vocabulary / Spelling

The more one reads the more words the reader puts into his/her word bank. The more one reads the more words the reader learns to visually recognize. Sometimes the exposure to new words does not go far enough. Sometimes a word looks familiar but just isn't right. The reader realizes that and autocorrects the word to the familiar word. But there are "rare" words that the casual reader never encounters. Those readers who read extensively will come across those rare words and will recognize legitimate words even though they are similar to other more familiar and less rare words. 
